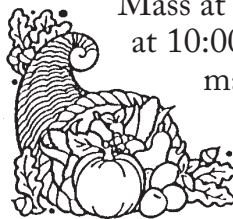



What is a Holy Day of Obligation

On holy days of obligation, Catholics are obliged to attend in Mass. All Sundays are holy days of obligation, as are six other days throughout the year. These holy days of obligation are:

- Feast of Mary, the Mother of God, 1 January
- Ascension Thursday; 40 days after Easter (in our Diocese it is moved to the closest Sunday)
- Assumption of Mary, 15 August
- All Saints' Day, 1 November
- Feast of the Immaculate Conception, 8 December
- Christmas, 25 December

Holy days are like Sundays in that Catholics must attend Mass, and if possible, refrain from unnecessary servile work. Some Catholic countries, such as Italy, Spain, and Ireland, give legal holiday status to some of these holy days, so people can attend Mass and be with family instead of at work.

In the US, Christmas Day (25 December) and the Immaculate Conception (8 December) are always days of obligation. The highest-ranking holy days are Christmas and Easter (which always falls on Sunday), and the Immaculate Conception is the feast for the United States. However, if any of the other holy days fall on a Saturday or Monday, they aren't considered holy days of obligation, because they're back-to-back with Sunday. The concern is that it would be burdensome to many Catholics to have to go to church two days in a row.

Some parts of the United States have moved holy days, such as the Ascension from Thursday to the closest Sunday. If you are unsure if a holy day is an obligatory day, just go to Mass anyway. Mass is never a waste of time, even if the day is not obligatory.

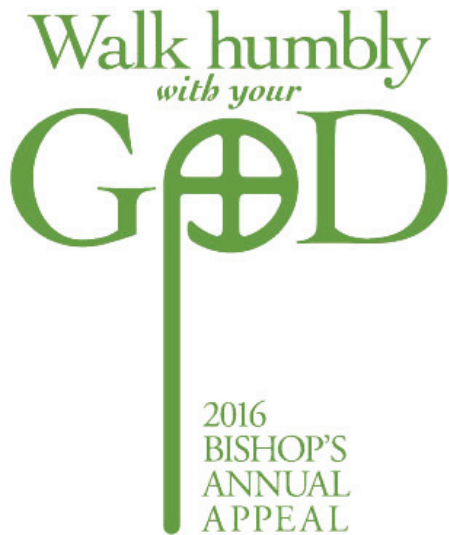

Advent~Meaning and Traditions

Advent comes from a Latin word and means "coming." But what is Advent, really? Advent is the beginning of a new liturgical year for the Roman Catholic Church. On the first day of Advent, which begins this year on November 27th, the Church celebrates its own kind of New Year's Day. Advent begins each year on the Sunday closest to November 30th, which is the feast day of Saint Andrew the Apostle.

Is Advent the same as Christmas? Sometimes people mistakenly think that Advent is part of the Christmas celebration. But actually, Advent is a time of preparation all its own. For the Catholic Church, Christmas doesn't begin until the first Mass is celebrated on Christmas Eve, and the Twelve Days of Christmas continue until the Feast of Epiphany on January 6th. Advent is given to us as a time to prepare our souls for the coming of the Lord. This season is very similar to Lent, so its nickname is the "Little Lent." In our current culture, we are tempted to skip over the penitential aspects of Advent and focus on the joy of Christmas. This is a great tragedy. Focusing on the joy alone denies a crucially important truth: *that the Christ Child is Our Lord and Savior, Who will suffer and die for our salvation.*

What is the history of Advent? Originally, Advent was celebrated for forty days, just like the Lenten season. This has now been adjusted to four weeks, but the symbolism remains. You may notice another similarity to Lent when you attend Mass during this Advent season: although we still sing the Alleluia before the Gospel reading, we no longer sing the song of the angels: the Gloria. We will wait to sing this song anew with the angels on Christmas day, just as they did over two thousand years ago.

The Scripture readings at Mass remind us of all the prophecies that point to the Lord's coming. We are called to keep watch and to leave behind our sinful ways. We also hear the recurring theme of a light shining through the darkness. Isaiah 60:19 reminds us of this promise: "The sun shall be no longer be your light by day, nor for brightness shall the moon give light to you by night; but the Lord will be your everlasting light, and your God will be your glory."

What is the meaning of the Advent Wreath? Since circles have no beginning and no end, the circular shape of many Advent wreaths is used to symbolize God the Father and eternal life. The wreath (or candleholder) holds four Advent candles which are lit one by one throughout the four weeks of Advent. The burning

flame is a visual reminder that Christ is "the light of the world." (John 8:12) There are three violet (purple) candles and one rose candle, each representing 1,000 years. Added together, the four candles symbolize the 4,000 years that humanity waited for the Savior. Violet is a liturgical color that is used to signify a time of penance, sacrifice, and prayer. During the first, second, and fourth weeks of Advent we light violet candles. The

Third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete (Latin for "Rejoice") Sunday. On this day we celebrate that our wait for Christmas is almost over. Rose is a liturgical color that is used to signify joy, so we light the rose candle on Gaudete Sunday. As each candle is lit and the light grows brighter, we are reminded that the Light of the World will soon arrive in glory.

Traditionally, each of the four candles on an Advent wreath has their own meaning. These meanings are illustrated in The Four Weeks of Advent. The 1st Sunday of Advent symbolizes Hope, with the "Prophet's Candle" reminding us that Jesus is coming. The 2nd symbolizes Faith, with the "Bethlehem Candle" reminding us of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem. The 3rd symbolizes Joy, with the "Shepherd's Candle" reminding us of the Joy the world experienced at the coming birth of Jesus. The 4th symbolizes Peace with the "Angel's Candle" reminding us of the message of the angels: "Glory to God in the highest; and on earth peace to men of good will."

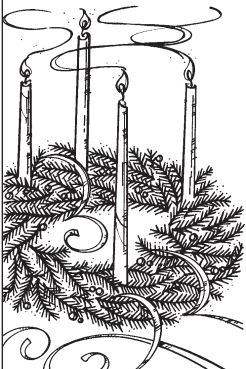
When Advent Wreaths are decorated, the materials often have symbolic meaning. The use of different greens evergreens reminds us of our eternal life with Christ: Ivy—to remind us of the human spirit clinging to God's strength; Cedar—to remind us of eternal life available to all through Christ; Holly—to remind us of Jesus' crown of thorns; Bay—to remind us of victory over sin and death; Pine cones symbolize Christ's Resurrection.

How can my children participate in Advent? Advent is a great way to keep children focused on preparing for the coming of the Christ Child rather than on materialistic desires. Each new week of Advent begins at Mass with the lighting of a new candle on the parish's Advent wreath. Our parish family is connected to our own family when we light our Advent Wreath at home. Explain to your children the meaning of each week's candle, and what they should focus on during the coming week.

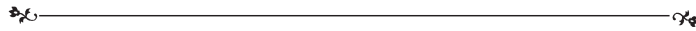
Another great way to get your kids involved is with an Advent Calendar. Most calendars feature a bright and colorful nativity scene at the Bethlehem stable and include twenty-four windows. Each window opens to reveal a passage from the Bible that tells the nativity story. Some even contain surprises! Children can prepare for Christmas by opening a window each day during Advent.

A fun way to keep kids involved is to take your children out on a nature hunt to gather the materials to decorate an Advent wreath. Explain to them the symbolism of each item and then let them arrange the items on your wreath. (Please keep in mind that the items may become flammable as they dry out! Before using your collected pieces, you can soak them in water or find a craft spray that is fire resistant.) Also be aware that many of the berries found on plants this time of year are poisonous for children and pets, so please use caution. (Or pick out silk decorations from your favorite craft store.)

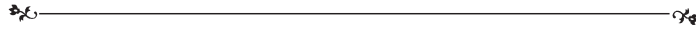
